He was fun-loving with an outgoing and kindhearted spirit and a zest for life that was contagious to all who were near. There was no greater love than the love Terry had for his family, and he was filled with unspeakable joy to witness his family tree blossom to include numerous branches of loved ones to treasure. Guided by an unwavering faith, he was generous beyond compare with a desire to help others in whatever way he could. Life will never be the same without Terry here, but he leaves behind a timeless legacy rooted in kindness, grace, and generosity that his loved ones will proudly carry on in his footsteps.

It seems only fitting that Terry's journey began during a time that was as vibrant as he was as the 1950s brought us stars like James Dean and Marilyn Monroe while Elvis Presley took the music world by storm with his rock 'n roll music. It was on March 21, 1957, that Rev. Robert and Marie (Plocek) King were pleased to announce the birth of the baby boy they named Terry in Montpelier, Ohio. Terry didn't get to drive it much since he got caught driving like a NASCAR driver by his grandpa and uncle, which left his driving privileges indefinitely suspended by Grandpa King. He graduated high school

from Central Montcalm, completed his Bachelor's degree at Ferris State University, then worked on his Master's degree at Michigan State University, finally completing it at Central Michigan University. With a heart to serve others, Terry made a career helping people in his community. He was most recently working as the community coordinator for the Montcalm and Ionia Counties Department of Health and Human Services. As a social worker for the State of Michigan, Terry had dedicated countless hours working for people in need. He coordinated the

volunteers for people who could not afford or couldn't figure out their income taxes. Terry loved anything to do with kids, even going so far as using his own resources and time to help them out. No matter the home environment he had to work in, Terry never let the kids of that home down.

There was never anything of greater significance in Terry's life than his family. He was an amazing father to his three children, Daniyel, Robbie, and Kyle. Robbie remembers when he was 15 or 16 he had




